Welcome to the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa!

This brief guide explains our campus buildings and surroundings in detail. This tour will take approximately 1 ½ to 2 hours. Whether you are here on campus or with us in spirit, we hope that you get a better feel of the UH Mānoa campus and what we have to offer our campus community.

We suggest beginning your tour at the Varney Circle fountain.

Please refer to your campus map at the end of this booklet to assist with your navigation around campus. The highlighted buildings will be showcased during your tour. Parking locations on the map are indicated in orange. Roadways are in grey and walking paths are in tan. Please follow the footstep directions as they will lead you to your destinations. You are welcome to view the inside of buildings and classrooms as long as classes are not in session.



QLCSS

Queen Lili'uokalani Center for Student Services (QLCSS)

Queen Lili'uokalani, was the last reigning monarch of the Kingdom of Hawai'i. The concept behind this building was to consolidate all services for students in one place. This five story building consists of the following offices:

On the ground floor there is the Office of Undergraduate Admissions, Office of the Registrar (Records & Registration), KOKUA Program (Disability Access), and Parking office.

The first floor provides services for students including the Mānoa Advising Center (MAC), Pre-Health/Pre-Law Advising Center (PAC), College of Arts and Sciences Student Academic Services, Financial Aid Office, Cashier's Office, and Kokua a Puni (Native Hawaiian Student Services).

The second floor has additional services for students to take advantage of such as the Office of Admissions for Recruitment and Campus Tours, Career Development and Student Employment, Women's Center, Service Learning Office, National Student Exchange Office, International Student Services, and the Judicial Affairs Office.

On the third floor there is the Office of Multicultural Student Services, Counseling and Student Development Center, and Testing Office

On the fourth floor there is Na Pua No'eau Center for Gifted and Talented Native Hawaiian Children, Office of Student Affairs, Office of Vice Chancellor of Students, Senior Citizen Visitor Program Office, and Student Equity Excellence and Diversity (SEED) Office.

If you're facing QLCSS, walk left and into the QUAD. You will pass Hawai'i Hall on the left and Saunders Hall will be on your right.



Saunders Hall

Saunders Hall (on right)

Home of the Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Science, Public Administration, Sociology, Urban & Regional Planning, and Women’s Studies department.

Saunders Hall is the model of sustainability for the campus, Hawai’i, and beyond. All lights in the building have been changed to CFL and solar power panels are used. The building contains classrooms, offices, and computer labs available for student use.



Continue walking straight ahead and make your way toward the QUAD. Stop when you reach Crawford Hall on your right.

The QUAD

The area known as the “QUAD” refers to the five original buildings that once comprised the entire College of Hawai’i in the 1920’s: Hawai’i Hall, Crawford Hall, George Hall, Gartley Hall, and Dean Hall.

Hawai’i Hall (on left)



Hawai’i Hall

Built in 1912, Hawai’i Hall is the oldest building on campus. Currently it is the home of administrative and academic services.

Crawford Hall (on right)



Crawford Hall

Home of the School of Communication and Journalism programs. Computer and multimedia labs are available for students to conduct complete video production. It’s also home to the Creative Media program. Creative Media students have interned on the set of ABC’s hit series LOST, Superman Returns, and have presented films at various film festivals both nationally and internationally. The building also contains classrooms and a lecture auditorium.

George Hall (on right)



George Hall

Home of the Department of Ethnic Studies, Speech Program, and the School of Travel Industry Management (TIM), offering International Tourism Education and Training. The building contains classrooms and a lecture auditorium.

Architecture Building (on right)



Architecture Building

Home of the School of Architecture where students can pursue their Architecture Doctorate (Arch D.) one of the three professional programs offered at UH Mānoa. The building contains an art gallery, media center, 200-seat auditorium, and 14 design studios with 210 designated workstations.



Gartley Hall

Gartley Hall (on left)

Home of the Psychology program, one of the largest programs in the Colleges of Arts and Sciences with over 500 undergraduate students. (Currently undergoing renovations)

Dean Hall (on left)

Home of the Biology, Marine Biology, and Marine Option Program. These programs offer unique opportunities for hands-on learning, access to state of the art facilities, and extensive field experience.

Business Administration Building (on right)

Home of the Shidler College of Business. Ranked in the top 20 in the nation for its undergraduate international business program, the Shidler College of Business was the first business program in the state. The building houses many classrooms and two large lecture auditoriums seating 176 people each.



Follow the pathway down between Dean Hall and Gartley Hall. Cross Campus Road and Sinclair Library will be directly in front of you.



Sinclair Library

Sinclair Library (1 of 3 Libraries on campus) (straight ahead)

One of three libraries on campus, Sinclair Library is the home of approximately 140,000 books dated pre-1950's. This library also houses the Student Success Center where student can work with faculty, librarians, mentors, and tutors to meet individually defined learning needs, First Year Programs, and the Wong Audiovisual Center.



To see the College of Education, cross University Avenue to Wist and Everly Hall.



Wist Hall

Wist Hall and Everly Hall (on right)

Home of the College of Education. One of 15 institutions in the nation that has formally established a working school/ university partnership (University Laboratory School).



Behind Sinclair Library is Bachman Hall (At the corner of University and Dole Street.

Bachman Hall (straight ahead)

Home of the University of Hawai'i system administration. This is also the entrance to the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa campus and Mānoa valley.



Facing Sinclair Library, head back to Campus Rd. on the pathway fronting Hemenway Hall .

Hemenway Hall (on right)

Home of the School of Dental Hygiene, Graduate Student Organization, KTUH (non-commercial radio station run by students), UH Hairstyling & Barber Shop, and the Leisure Center. Ba-Le restaurant is also located here and provides an outdoor-indoor cafeteria-style dining serving Vietnamese and French inspired sandwiches.



Continue walking straight until you reach the green path Campus Center entrance will be on your right.



Campus Center

CAMPUS CENTER (The Student Union Building) (straight ahead)

On the ground floor you'll find popular eateries such as Pizza Hut and Taco Bell. There is also a games room available for students to relax in that features pool tables and gaming systems. Also on the ground floor are Business works of Hawai'i, ATM machines, as well as the University Bookstore.

Available on the second floor is the Campus Dining Food Court which offers an array of dining options such as: Aja sushi serving fusion Asian cuisine, salads, wraps, 155° Grill serving burgers and fries, and a plate lunch station with local favorites. Additional eateries such as Jamba Juice, Corner Market Café serving Starbucks coffee, and Subway are also available on this floor. Also on this floor is the Student Life and Development office as well as various administrative offices.

Ticket & Information Services Office

Provides general information; ticket sales including bus passes, UH athletic games and concert tickets, movie tickets; lost & found; faxes; lamination; UH ID's; general campus tours, and serves an official Passport acceptance facility.

The third floor has a Ballroom which can hold 600 guests, meeting rooms, and a student lounge with sofas, study tables, computer lab, and copying services. Since Campus Center is WiFi enabled, students often use this area to study, get online access, and even relax or catch a quick snooze before their next class.

Renovations

Campus Center, which is a gathering place for students, is currently in phase two of its three phase renovation and expansion plan that includes the building of a new Recreational Center. You can track the renovation process at: www.hawaii.edu/campuscenter/renovation.



Walk through Campus Center and pass by Jamba Juice. Continue down the stairway towards the green tent. Turn right, past the Taco Bell & Pizza Hut sign. Turn right down Legacy Path toward Dole street.

Andrews Outdoor Theater (on right)

Seats 5,500 people. The theater is used for concerts, convocation ceremonies, and other community events.

Krauss Hall (on left)

Home of Psychology faculty offices. Students can meet privately with instructors and faculty members to discuss course content.



Cross over Dole Street. You are now entering lower campus. Optional: To see the athletic facilities, walk to the end of the pathway next to the escalators. Otherwise, continue on to Student housing. (Approx. 8 min. walk)

William S. Richardson School of Law and Library (straight ahead)

Home of the School of Law, the building contains classrooms and a mock courthouse for students to gain hands-on experience.

ATHLETIC COMPLEX

Tennis Courts (on left)

Duke Kahanomoku Swimming Pool Aquatic Complex (on left)

Cooke Field – Track and Field & Football practice Field (on left)

Men’s Baseball Stadium (known as Les Murakami Stadium) (on left)

Women’s Softball Field (on left)

Stan Sheriff Center (straight ahead)

Home of the UHM women’s and men’s basketball and volleyball teams. This facility seats 10,225 people. The complex houses locker rooms, hospitality suites, Kinesiology and Rehabilitation Science classrooms, coaches offices, and weight room facilities.

Physical Education/ Athletic Complex (straight ahead)

Includes two gyms, three studios, two weight rooms, one lecture hall, two classrooms, lockers/ shower facilities, and offices of athletic directors.

Klum Gym (on right)

This is the home of UHM intramural sports and has a seating capacity of 1,800 people.

Intramural Sports Office (associated with SLD) (on left)

Provides organized leagues and tournaments and free play of recreational activities in a variety of sports. Equipment check out available for use.

Nagatani Academic Center (on right)

Learning center for student athletes. Tutors and academic advisors are available by appointment.



Beyond the Duke Kahanomoku Pool is the Hale Anuenue residence hall and AirForce and Army ROTC portables.

Hale (Hawaiian word for house) Anuenue (straight ahead)

Accommodates 82 residents in a three story walk-up. This residence hall offers air conditioning. A community kitchen is located on the roof top. Lounges can be found on each floor. Students interested or within the College of Education can request to live a living learning community based here.

Air Force and Army ROTC portables

Home of the Air Force and Army ROTC programs. Here, students are trained to become officers in the US Air Force and Army while getting an education.



Johnson Hall



If you choose not to see the athletic complex, cross Dole Street. Facing the Law School, head left towards the Student Housing Complex and offices. The first residence hall you'll see is Johnson Hall – A on the right.

STUDENT HOUSING

All rooms are equipped with internet and cable connection. Community washers and dryers are available for each residence hall.

Johnson Hall A & B (on right)

Accommodates 195 residents in two 3-story buildings, there are 97 double occupancy rooms. Students share community bathrooms and lounge facilities. Scheduled renovations to begin Spring 2011.

International Gateway House (on right)

Accommodates 208 residents in two 10 story buildings. Six 4-person suites are on each floor each with their own bathroom facility.

Frear Hall (on left)

Accommodates 810 residents in two 12 story connecting towers. Four types of rooms are available with air conditioning.

The Student Housing Services office is located on the south side of the building.



To view additional residence halls, walk down the path between Gateway House and Frear Hall (15 min walk from Dole St.)

Hale Aloha Towers

Hale (Hawaiian word for house) Aloha Residence Halls (straight ahead)

Ilima, Lehua, Lokelani, Mokihana (designated freshman halls)

Each tower accommodates 266 residents on 13 floors. Approximately 26 students share double rooms on each floor. Student lounges are on every other floor and a community lounge and study room are located on the roof top.



Hale Noelani

Hale Noelani (on left)

Apartment style suites that accommodates 524 residents. Five 3 story buildings make up this facility. Suites include a furnished kitchen, living room, bedrooms, and bathroom. This hall is reserved for upperclassman students.



Hale Wainani

Hale Wainani (on left)

Apartment style suites that accommodate 650 residents in 41 one-bedroom and 142 two-bedroom units. Two 3 story buildings and two 14 story buildings make up this facility. Suites include a furnished kitchen, living room, bedrooms, and bathroom. This hall is reserved for upperclassman students.



Lo'i patch Kamakakūokalani Center for Hawaiian Studies



To see the Kamakakūokalani Hawaiian Studies Building, facing Frear Hall walk left. Then turn right at the Kamakakūokalani Building. (5 min walk from Frear Hall)

Kamakakūokalani Center for Hawaiian Studies (on right)

Home of the Hawaiian Language and Hawaiian Studies Programs. The building contains classrooms, a media center, and computer labs. Also offered is a hands-on learning environment for students to maintain an actual lo'i (man-made irrigated patch for taro).



Holmes Hall



Back on Dole Street, facing the Kamakakūokalani Building, head right on Dole St. Then, take a right at the stop-light and walk up East –West Road until you reach the Biomedical sciences building.

Holmes Hall (on left)

Home of the College of Engineering. The College of Engineering offers degrees in Civil, Computer, Electrical, and Mechanical Engineering. Ocean Engineering is also offered through the School of Ocean and Earth Science and Technology.



Marine Science Building

Marine Science Building (on left)

The building contains 56 labs, and two auditorium-type classrooms that seat 50-75 respectively. Departments include Oceanography and the Joint Institute for Marine and Atmospheric Research.



University Health Services

University Health Services (on left)

Staffed by physicians, nurse clinicians, nurses, and other support staff. Services include: General medical clinic, the women's health clinic, sports medicine, dermatology, pharmacy, clinical laboratory, student training, as well as employment and volunteer opportunities.



Hale Mānoa

Hale Mānoa (on right)

A 13 story residence hall for international and graduate students.

John F. Kennedy Theatre (on left)

Fourteen to twenty-four productions are offered each year in the Kennedy Theatre and the Earle Ernst Laboratory Theatre providing a wealth of opportunities for participation as actors, dancers, directors, choreographers, designers, technicians, and playwrights. The department houses our world renowned Asian Theatre Program, the largest and oldest program in the world.

Henke Hall (on left)

Home of the School of Social Work. The building contains offices for faculty and staff within the School of Social Work.

Language Lab Inside Moore Hall

Moore Hall (on left)

The home of the School of Pacific Asian Studies and Study Abroad office. The language lab unit of the Colleges of Languages, Literature, and Linguistics, is the largest facility of its kind in the world. It consists of 6 labs, a recording studio, interpretation facilities, and a satellite dish which receives international television programs.



Hale Kahawai



On your right, across East-West Road are the upper campus residence halls.

Hale Kahawai (on right)

Accommodates 154 residents in a four story building accessible by stairs. A community kitchen and laundry facility are located on the first floor. Lounges can be found on each floor.



Hale Laulima

Hale Laulima (on right)

Accommodates 160 residents in a four story building accessible by stairs. A community kitchen and laundry facility are located on the first floor. Lounges can be found on each floor.



Center for Korean Studies

Center for Korean Studies (on right)

The center for Korean Studies was established in 1972 to promote scholarly research on Korea. UHM was the second U.S. university to offer a degree in Korean Language.



Agriculture Science Building

Agriculture Science Building (on right)

Home of the Food Science and Human Nutrition, Animal Sciences, and Molecular Biosciences and Bioengineering Programs.



Biomedical Sciences Building

Biomedical Sciences Building

Home of the Office of Public Health Sciences and Department of Medical Technology. The building contains classrooms and two large lecture auditoriums.



Head back down East-West Road and turn right on Maile Way until you reach Gilmore Hall



Gilmore Hall

St. John Plant Science Laboratory

Home of the Tropical Plant and Soil Sciences and Botany Programs.

Gilmore Hall

Home of the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources.



Paradise Palms



On Maile Way, head back toward Hamilton Library and Paradise Palms. Turn right onto the brick path. After passing Paradise Palms on your left, walk down the stairs and follow McCarthy Mall on your right.

Paradise Palms Café (on left)

Offers dining options such as hand rolled sushi and salads, Quiznos, Chow Mein Express, Warrior Grill, Lava Bean, and Greek food.

Hamilton Library (on right)

The largest library in the state of Hawai'i. Home to 2.9 million volumes including a Hawaiian & Pacific collection. PC Computer labs are available for student use.



Keller Hall

MCCARTHY MALL "The Mall"

Originally "Old McCarthy Road" this area was part of the University Farm, but due to the expansion, the road was transformed into a pedestrian mall.

Keller Hall (on left)

Home of the Mathematics Department. Tutoring is available for students enrolled in Math 100. The ITS help desk is also located in this building to assist students with wireless internet connection and computer security systems.



Physical Science Building

Physical Science Building (located behind Keller Hall)

The building contains a lecture auditorium seating 300 people, a computer lab, classrooms, and science labs.

Bilger Hall (on left)

Home of the Chemistry Department. The building contains lecture auditoriums, one seating 176 people and the other seating 363 people and two laboratories. A Chemistry tutorial room is located in room 337.



Snyder Hall

Edmonson and Snyder Hall (on right)

Home of the Zoology and Microbiology Departments. The buildings contain classrooms and laboratories.

Spalding Hall (on right)

Home of the Graduate Division Office and Hawaiian & Indo-Pacific Languages. The building contains a large lecture auditorium with a seating capacity of 385 people.

Webster Hall (on right)

Home of the School of Nursing. Features a state-of-the-art learning center, computer center, classrooms, and web-enhanced courses.



Miller Hall



Once you reach the Art building, go down the pathway. Miller Hall will be on your right and the Art Building on your left. Walk until you reach Kuykendall Hall.

Miller Hall (on right)

Home of the Family and Consumer Sciences department including Family Resources and Apparel Product Design and Merchandising. It also houses the largest collection of costumes in the Pacific dating from the late 1800's to today. The building contains classrooms and design studios.



Art Building

Art Building (on left)

Home of the Art Department. The building contains a large lecture auditorium that seat 300 people, classrooms, studios, two art galleries, and a bamboo garden.

Kuykendall Hall (on right)

Home of the English department and biography research center. The building contains classrooms and a computer lab.



Turn left on Correa Road and go until you reach the Sustainability Courtyard on your right. Then head straight down to Sakamaki Hall. The POST building will be on your left.

Sustainability Courtyard

A designated non-smoking courtyard which provides vegetarian food options. Recyclable bins are located within the courtyard and all furniture is constructed from recycled materials.

Home of the School of Ocean and Earth and Science Technology.



HIG Building

Sakamaki Hall (straight ahead)

Home of the Religion, History, Psychology, and Philosophy Departments. The building contains small classrooms and a computer lab.

Pacific Ocean Science and Technology Building (POST) (on left)

Home of the Ocean and Earth Science and Technology and Department of Information and Computer Sciences. The building contains classrooms and lecture auditoriums.
